Public Utilities Hosts Wateropolis Simulation

A lot more goes on in the decision-making process of public utilities than meets the eye. The **Public Utilities Department** hosted an interactive exercise called "Wateropolis" for all internal employees to attend and learn more about their role in the community. In this three-hour simulation, employees were able to enjoy a hands-on experience with the complexities of utility budgeting, managing competing priorities, and adapting to shifting consumption and revenue trends.

The presentation began with a brief history on the relationship between the public and public utilities, addressing concerns about water quality and the delivery of clean water to homes.




To strengthen the relationship among consumers and public utilities departments in the United States, the Clean Water Act of 1972 was enacted as a set of rules and regulations that remain in force today.

For the exercise, participants were split into "Wateropolis" teams, each acting as a public utilities department. Each team faced a series of budgeting scenarios and had to weigh priorities, including customer satisfaction,



As the scenarios grew more complex, each team made tough decisions, bringing into perspective the day-to-day challenges our Clearwater Public Utilities staff and leaders face.

Toward the end of the simulation, as teams compared results on decisions made, participants gained a deeper understanding of the "behind-the-curtain" processes and how our Clearwater team navigates these challenges and makes decisions. Overall, this simulation highlighted how hard our team works every day to ensure the best service for the community.



For 18 years, Compliance and Contract Manager **Doniela Prifti** has been a cornerstone of Clearwater's Public Utilities Department. Her role might sound highly technical, as she oversees laboratory contracts, testing programs, and ensures the city meets every state and federal regulation. But at its core, Prifti says it's about one thing: protecting the health of the community.



Her passion for science started early. "I grew up in a little town called Pogradec, right on the shores of Lake Ohrid in Albania, the oldest and deepest lake in Europe," she shares. "When most kids were busy climbing trees or skipping rocks, I was already fascinated by the tiny creatures living in the water and the science behind it all." This led Prifti's passion for biology and chemistry, and soon she was graduating in the top 3% of her class from the University of Natural Science in 1997 with a degree in chemistry.

Two years later, she immigrated to the United States through the Department of State's diversity visa program. Adjusting to a new country and culture wasn't easy, but her determination carried her through. "It was difficult in the beginning," she recalls. "But I was determined to make it."

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Employee Spotlight: Doniela Prifti

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Her career began in the private sector with Minute Maid, now Coca-Cola, where she worked in food compliance and gained a deeper understanding of industry standards. That experience proved invaluable when she joined Clearwater in 2007. Since then, she has been a driving force in maintaining water quality and regulatory compliance, ensuring that residents can count on safe, reliable services. "I became something of a lab 'Swiss Army watch," she jokes, "running advanced instruments with complicated names, leading teams, managing audits, reviewing data, and making sure quality systems worked."

Prifti describes her role as being "a middleman between plants and laboratories," balancing multiple operations to keep results accurate and aligned with strict standards. Her passion, she says, is to protect both public health and the environment, and her work ethic is fueled by integrity and the pursuit of perfection. "I always want our instruments and results to come back perfect every time," she explains.

Despite the technical demands of her work, Prifti emphasizes the supportive environment she has found in Clearwater. "What I enjoy most is how helpful everyone has been. I've always had the support of my leadership team, and the focus is always on doing everything for the community." For her, every day feels like an accomplishment: sustaining clean, safe water for residents while contributing to a healthier, more sustainable future.

Outside of work, Prifti is a proud mother of two daughters: one attending the University of South Florida and the other at the University of Florida. She sees her journey, beginning with her move from Albania to building a career in science, and raising a family, as a testament to perseverance and hard work.

When asked what advice she would give to others starting out in their careers, Prifti doesn't hesitate: "Stay curious, stay brave, and remember that even the smallest actions can ripple out and change the world. If a kid from a little town by Lake Ohrid can grow up to protect pelicans, drinking water, and whole communities, just imagine what you can do."

The city of Clearwater is proud to highlight Prifti's contributions and celebrate not just her professional achievements, but also the character and values she brings to her work every day. Her story is a reminder that dedication, integrity, and passion can leave a lasting impact on both a workplace and a community.

housing leaders and organizations whose work highlights the purpose and impact of affordable housing in their communities.




